## Help us with our survey by looking out for:



#### Harbour porpoise (Phocoena phocoena)

• Small porpoise, up to 1.7 metres long. • Distinctive small triangular dorsal fin with broad base. • Dark grey upper, usually no markings or scars. • White belly. Head tapers to a point, with no beak.
Most frequently seen January – April.

#### Bottlenose dolphin (Tursiops truncatus)

• Large, stocky dolphin, up to 4 metres long. • Fairly tall and slender dorsal fin, usually sickle-shaped. • Grey rather uniform upper parts. Can appear black in dull light. • Underside paler, but no flank markings. • Short, stubby, but distinct beak.

• Most frequently seen July - October.



#### White-beaked dolphin (Lagenorhynchus albirostris)

• Dolphin up to 2.8 metres long. • Large, often erect, sickle-shaped dorsal fin, centrally placed. • Short white beak. • Black back with a white or grey area behind the dorsal fin, forming a pale 'saddle'. • Stout-looking animal with a large girth. Most frequently seen June – October.

#### **Common seal** (Phoca vitulina)

• Seal up to 1.5 metres long. • Round face with narrow nostrils, dog-like features (see illustration at top). • Grey back with dark brown or blackish spots. • Belly lighter and without spots. • Thick neck and quite elongated body.

- Pups born mainly June July.



#### Grey seal (Halichoerus grypus)

• Seal up to 2.5 metres long. • Prominent hooked-shaped nose with nostrils fairly wide apart. • Males: dark with light patches and a wide, heavy muzzle. Females: smaller and light coloured with dark spots. • Coat varies from grey and brown to silver, often blotchy. • Pups born mainly August - November.
